Andrew Powell is Lead Research Economist in the Inter-American Development Bank and Professor at the Universidad Torcuato Di Tella, Buenos Aires. He holds a BA, MA and Ph.D (DPhil.) from the University of Oxford. Through 1994 he dedicated himself to academia in the UK as Prize Research Fellow at Nuffield College Oxford and Lecturer (Associate Professor) at London University and the University of Warwick. In 1995, he joined the Central Bank of Argentina rising to the position of Chief Economist in 1996. He represented Argentina in a G10 working party on emerging debt market instability and as a G20/G22 deputy and member of three G22 working groups (on crisis resolution, financial system strengthening and transparency). In May 2001, he returned to academia, joining the Universidad Torcuato Di Tella as Director of graduate programs in finance at the Business School. He has acted as a Consultant to the World Bank, the Inter-American Development Bank, the IMF and various Governments and was a Visiting Scholar at Harvard University in 2004. He has published in areas including commodity price behavior, regulation, banking, and international finance. Most recent papers in academic journals include on the Argentine crisis; on the role of the IMF; on the behavior of international banks; on dollarization and on Basel II and emerging countries.
