His recent books include *Insurance Redlining* (Urban Institute Press 1997), *Color and Money* (with Sally O'Connor - SUNY Press 2001), *Urban Sprawl* (Urban Institute Press 2002), *Organizing Access to Capital* (Temple University Press 2003), *Why the Poor Pay More: How to Stop Predatory Lending* (Praeger 2004), *Privileged Places: Race, Residence and the Structure of Opportunity* (with Charis E. Kubrin – Lynne Rienner 2006) and *There is No Such Thing as a Natural Disaster: Race, Class, and Hurricane Katrina* (with Chester Hartman – Routledge 2006).
